letter from the PRESIDENT

Dear CCU Community,

It is with a renewed sense of excitement that I pen this letter for the Fall 2024 edition of Beyond Magazine. For the last year, I have watched the Armstrong Center slowly rise from the ground just outside my office windows. What seemed like a dream six years ago when I first came to Colorado Christian University has become a reality.

The Armstrong Center is the new academic and cultural cornerstone of the Lakewood campus. It reunites the School of Music to the heart of campus, houses a state-of-the-art library accessible to 1,450 traditional on-campus students and 9,113 CCU Online adult and graduate students, provides essential classroom space for all schools, and features the University's first dedicated sacred chapel — the Terry and Betsy Considine Chapel. This facility will host a hub of activity for CCU's growing community, both locally and globally.

The Armstrong Center is much more than just another college building. It is the culmination of more than a decade of prayerful planning, philanthropic dedication, and hard work. It is the embodiment of the vision for whom the center is named, William L. Armstrong, a former U.S. senator, businessman, and the 20th president of CCU. It is also a sign of the momentum that continues to sweep across the University as we honor the past while moving forward with conviction, courage, and character.

This momentum is not restrained to a building. It is seen firsthand in the innovative partnership with Compassion International as our students serve as the hands and feet of Jesus on the ground in Honduras (p. 6), a work we pray will result in three to five students joining the Lakewood campus annually to continue their education. It is the global reach of the University as students study in world capitals such as London and Washington D.C. (p. 10). It is the willingness to serve our local communities as evidenced by the Sojourners ministering to the unhoused community just steps from campus (p. 20).

Thank you for your continued support of Colorado Christian University and the impact of our mission to provide Christ-centered higher education that transforms students to impact the world with grace and truth. As you read these pages, may you, like me, give praise and glory to Jesus!

The Honduras Project

What could happen if a university committed its mission focus to a single location, a single neighborhood, and a single project designed to change the trajectory of a whole city for the sake of the gospel?

In September of 2023, a small team from Colorado Christian University traveled to San Pedro Sula, Honduras, to explore that very question, and the Honduras Project was born.

In partnership with Compassion International, CCU has founded and adopted a child development center that sits on the property of a local church in the suburbs of San Pedro Sula. In this community, the average monthly income is around eight dollars. Few families own cars, and many homes lack basic necessities like running water and indoor bathrooms. Access to healthcare and education is extremely limited. Yet, at the Compassion Child Development Center, joy reigns. Every day, children receive food, clothing, tutoring, basic healthcare, and, most importantly, the hope of the gospel.

For the 168 children currently sponsored by CCU students, faculty, and staff, life is already looking brighter. And thanks to CCU's continual commitment, their future holds even greater promise.

The impact and growth of the Honduras project have captured the heart of President Eric Hogue and CCU leadership. With their support, the vision has expanded significantly this year. During every Chapel, three frontrow seats remain empty, each draped with a Honduran flag. These seats serve as a powerful reminder to pray for a shared dream and goal that one day, three students from San Pedro Sula will attend CCU on fully-funded scholarships. After earning their degrees, these

students will return to their community to make a lasting impact where it is most needed.

Other marks of God's hand have been clearly evident in this project as we've continued exploring new possibilities. Pastor Orlando, the lead pastor of the church where our Compassion site is hosted, has a deep heart for children. He built his church in this particular neighborhood because he recognized the challenges its children face. In addition to his pastoral work, Pastor Orlando is also a pharmacist and a small-business entrepreneur. He founded a health-care clinic housed within the church, but he hasn't yet been able to fully staff it, and resources for medications have been scarce. With CCU's help, this can all change.

God has used this partnership and my time in Honduras to show me how powerful it can be to understand the relationship we have with our brothers and sisters in Christ around the globe. The church really is a global family, and the family of God is so much bigger than I ever realized.

Pastor Orlando also oversees his denomination's regional pastor's coalition, providing theological education and church development resources to help churches in the area grow and thrive. He's a man of vision with a heart to serve and make a lasting impact.

It's hard to imagine a more custom-designed fit for a partnership with CCU, but we didn't know anything about Pastor Orlando or his church when we initially built the partnership. We didn't request a church that matched our priorities or programs. There wasn't a planning team aligning shared interests and available resources. In fact, there were no pre-existing connections at all. Pastor Orlando's church was simply next in line when CCU told Compassion International that we were ready to launch the project and fund a new location. It was a divine appointment.

But the marks of God's hand on this project don't stop with the unique nature of the partnership. In May 2024, CCU sent its first student team to Honduras. When they arrived on site, they were told the area was in desperate need of rain. After almost a year of drought, the community was experiencing the impact in major ways.

So, the CCU students did what they do best — they began to pray, asking God for mercy on this special city. As the first of many representatives of the love and commitment of a CCU community that has chosen to put a stake in the ground for the sake of the gospel, together they sought God's blessing.

And the skies opened up.

Before the trip was halfway over, the students were drenched, dancing and singing in the rain around the hotel grounds, celebrating one more sign that this team represents new hope for a place that needs it desperately. Throughout the trip, rainbows appeared after every downpour, reminding them of God's promise in Genesis — that the times of destruction are over, and these are the times

The people of Honduras beautifully exemplify the biblical truth that joy does not result from material wealth. In San Pedro Sula, the Body of Christ is thriving, the church is alive and growing, and capable, faithful leaders are bringing hope, restoration, and empowerment to a community that has endured far too much violence and despair.

Yet, much remains to be done. Families are broken, and too many children still look to gangs for protection and an escape from their oppressive neighborhoods. Educational opportunities are scarce and unaffordable. Basic healthcare is out of reach for far too many. Jobs are limited, forcing many men in the community to seek work in the United States. Though they promise to send money home to their families, the checks often stop coming, and the men never return, resulting in neighborhoods filled with single-mother households. And while the church steps in to help, as it always does, resources are limited.

Pastor Orlando and others like him are already on the ground, faithfully carrying out the good work of the gospel. Now, through the Honduras Project, we at CCU have the privilege of joining in that mission. We get to witness that work expand and grow. We get to see the long-held dreams of these faithful servants, who have been there for decades, come to life.

What a gift.

This first chapter has been quite a ride — an incredible journey — and the days ahead promise to be even better.

Experiential Learning with CCU

Because students thrive on hands-on, adventure-filled learning experiences, the College of Undergraduate Studies offers deep-dive travel courses on diverse topics. These courses demand a lot: Students attend weeks of course meetings in preparation, study in-depth works of history and culture, practice professional decorum with international business leaders, learn the art of various skills (like

archaeology, video-interviewing, and video editing), and write substantial reflections and papers.

Many of these courses have been offered multiple times over the years — and this photo display shows how engaging they have become.



FOOTSTEPS OF PAUL: BIB 397

Students travel to Greece, tracing the footsteps of biblical authors Paul, Luke, and John. They study the biblical text alongside the historical context related to the cities of Philippi, Thessalonica, Berea, Corinth, and Athens. Returning home, they read the pages of the New Testament with firsthand knowledge of the sights, smells, and sounds of the places where the Scriptures were first written and received.



SUPER BOWL: COM 398

Students attend Super Bowl media week, serving as the media crew for FSPN — The Faith+Sports Programming Network. They interview players and coaches about their faith in the context of preparing for the big game. They then produce packages for broadcast to various networks and outlets.

WASHINGTON WEEK: POL 378


In POL 378, students spend a week at the U.S. Capitol with a faculty member focused on the workings of the federal government, public policy think tanks, and current national issues. They hear directly from leading experts in policy areas ranging from domestic concerns to international relations. A key course goal is to encourage students to think deeply about the relationship between the Christian faith and political life.

INTERNATIONAL BUSINESS: BUS 500

The primary goal of this course is to provide students with better understanding of how business differs in Europe and how cultures impact it, while also familiarizing students with international travel, including navigating foreign cities, languages, and currencies. Student Kendal Baxmeyer reflected, "As a student who is newer to Christianity, Dr. Kerr enriched my spiritual journey by explaining complex doctrines and uncovering my spiritual gifts with remarkable clarity. His insightful guidance transformed my visits to sacred sites like the Vatican and St. Peter's Basilica into profoundly enlightening experiences."







This October, Colorado Christian University (CCU) hosted "Great Books Week: Touch the Books that Shaped the World," an event that brought history to life for students, faculty, and the wider community. From October 21-25, 2024, participants engaged with some of the most influential texts in human history, reflecting on how these works have shaped civilization and point to the ultimate Word that created the world.

In partnership with The Remnant Trust, a public education foundation dedicated to preserving and sharing important manuscripts and first editions, CCU displayed 10 priceless volumes spanning over 4,500 years of human thought and creativity. The collection included an Akkadian clay tablet from 2500 B.C., an illuminated manuscript of the Latin Vulgate Bible (1240 A.D.), and a first edition of "The Communist Manifesto" (1848).






Professors from the School of Theology and the School of Humanities and Social Sciences served as docents, providing context and insights into each text's significance. The weeklong event featured various activities, including classroom studies, a community open house that welcomed over 500 visitors, and special receptions for Augustine Honors students and the Board of Trustees. Dr. David Kotter, one of the event organizers, emphasized the unique nature of this exhibition. "Our goal was to provide a life-changing and memorable tactile experience with great books," he explained. "Seeing students hold a 16th-century Greek New Testament in their hands to read passages from the Gospel of John was truly remarkable."

Other notable works included "The Federalist Papers," William Wilberforce's "A Letter on the Abolition of the Slave Trade," and Thomas à Kempis' "Of the Imitation of Christ." Each text represented a pivotal moment in religion, philosophy, or political thought that shaped our world.

"Great Books Week" exemplified CCU's commitment to providing a Christ-centered education that engages with the foundational ideas of Western civilization. Through direct interaction with these historical texts, the University inspired a deeper appreciation for the power of the written word in shaping our world while ultimately pointing to Christ as the living Word.

Leading by Example

CCU Hosts the 48th Vice President and His Wife to Launch the First President's Speaker Series

COLORADO CHRISTIAN UNIVERSITY (CCU) AND INSPIRATIONAL LEADERS HAVE ALWAYS GONE HAND IN HAND, and on November 15, 2024, the inaugural event of the Armstrong Center's Doug and Melinda McDonald Performance Hall welcomed the 48th Vice President Mike Pence and former Second

Lady Karen Pence to the Lakewood campus.

Part of the President's Speaker Series hosted by CCU President Eric Hogue, the event expanded upon former CCU President Bill Armstrong's passion for cultivating the next generation of Christian leaders by introducing CCU students to influential voices who exemplify the University's mission and values. Students, faculty, staff, and CCU community members engaged in timely conversations on education, leadership, faith, family, and politics with this first of Hogue's innovative series to be held on campus..

The historic, full-day event with the Pences began with a breakfast featuring Karen Pence, hosted by First Lady Tammy Hogue, creating a space for educators and CCU community members to discuss the changing landscape of education. Tammy, a longtime teacher herself, admires the former second lady of the United States' powerful influence





in education and outstanding example of leadership for CCU's Schools of Education and Education Professions.

Karen Pence completed the event's morning session with an uplifting lecture on the divine calling of teaching. Speaking to a packed McDonald Performance Hall, the former second lady of the United States led attendees through her 30-year journey as an educator, while balancing her roles as a wife, mother of three, and supporter of her husband's extensive political career, which included 12 years in Congress, a season as the first lady of Indiana, and later the second lady of the United States.

"My desire was to always be a good steward of the positions in which God placed me, using each moment in time for Him and His purposes," shared Karen Pence, emphasizing the eternal impact of answering God's call in any vocation.

Following the lecture, Karen Pence joined a panel discussion with Tammy Hogue; CCU's Dean of the School of Education, Dr. Debora Scheffel; and Dean of the School of Education Professions, Dr. Jeffrey Renfrow. In Q&A fashion, the four addressed critical challenges facing teachers today, including the search for balance with technology in

the classroom, the effects of screen time on young students, the impact of COVID-19 on classroom behaviors and dynamics, and what teachers can do to thrive and have longevity in the field.

After a strong morning session, the festivities continued with a luncheon, bringing Mike Pence into the spotlight, followed by an evening session joined by President Hogue. In partnership with the Centennial Institute, Hogue selected Pence to lead the way with his President's Speaker Series as an outstanding representative of Christian leadership for CCU's students.

"The reason I wanted to kick off this series with Mike Pence is that if you had to pick one high-ranking, Christian evangelical, conservative leader who fits perfectly with the DNA of CCU, at the top of that list is Mike Pence. He represents our strategic priorities, our Statement of Faith, and he models the type of leadership we want from our students when they graduate from CCU," said Hogue. "I'm honored to welcome former Vice President Pence for the first event in the Armstrong Center's McDonald Performance Hall. Vice President Pence is CCU."

Reflecting the University's conservative Christian values, in his keynote address, Pence spoke into the importance of CCU's students impacting their career paths, communities, and the culture at large with grace and truth.

"Leadership begins in the gap, just as you're doing here at Colorado Christian University and through the Centennial Institute," said Pence. "You're training up a generation of leaders at a time in the life of our nation that I believe is our greatest natural need."

"More than anything else, America needs men and women of conviction and of principle, who will adhere to the foundations of faith, who will walk in obedience, who will claim the grace that is available in their faith... It's been men and women of integrity that have always ensured the vitality and the prosperity of living in this nation, and always will."

The topic of leadership continued throughout the evening among various threads of conversation between Pence and Hogue, including discussions around the state of the conservative movement within the Republican party, a look at the path forward for conservative principles in American society, and insights on the merging of faith, leadership, and public service.

In a special highlight of the evening, Karen Pence and Tammy Hogue joined their respective husbands in the final portion of the event, where the couples discussed marriage, families, and leadership, especially marriages in the spotlight, and how to keep family as a priority.

"I wanted students to be equipped to think about ways of overcoming challenges that can come with marriages and raising families while in leadership," said Hogue. "In married life, when the Lord calls you into a significant position of leadership, how do you keep the marriage first? These are the types of conversations that are great for our students to explore."

For CCU, hosting the 48th Vice President Mike pence and former second lady Karen Pence emphasizes the momentum building within the University as a whole, from the scaling of programs within the Schools of Education and Education Professions to the University's dedication to fostering faith-based leadership. This first event in the President's Speaker Series set a high standard and precedent for upcoming speakers throughout the year. The events are open to students, faculty, and community members, with hopes that these discussions will not only energize the CCU community but also inspire future leaders across the nation.

CCU Students Bring Hope and the Gospel to Denver's Streets

For over a quarter-century, Colorado Christian University's "Sojourners" ministry has been a beacon of hope on the streets of Denver. Every Thursday night, dozens of CCU students embark on a mission to share the love of Jesus with the city's homeless population.

The evening begins at 5 p.m. with food preparation, followed by prayer and a safety briefing at 6 p.m.. By 7 p.m., 10 teams of students disperse into Denver's poorest areas, armed with backpacks full of food, warm clothing, and an unwavering commitment to bring the love of Jesus to the least of these.

"Week after week students often greet people by name," says Dr. David Kotter, Dean of the School of Theology and faculty advisor for Sojourners. "This consistency builds trust and opens doors for prayer and meaningful conversations about the gospel of Jesus Christ."

Beyond immediate aid, Sojourners offers ongoing support. A dedicated team provides weekly Bible studies and meals at "The Forum," a federally subsidized housing complex, fostering long-term relationships and spiritual growth. Another group of students called the "Boiler Room" (after Charles Spurgeon's prayer team) remains on campus to intercede for evangelism and to prepare a post-briefing for the evening.

The impact of this ministry extends far beyond Denver. Dr. David Bosworth, a CCU professor, recounts a chance encounter in Atlanta with a former recipient of Sojourners' outreach. "Years after our students prayed with him, this man was sober, employed, and walking with Christ," Bosworth reported.

As Sojourners continues to shape the fabric of campus life, it also serves as practical training for future evangelists. Through this ministry, CCU students are not just serving the homeless — they're embodying the transformative power of the gospel of Jesus Christ in action.



Milestones Momentum

THE ARMSTRONG CENTER DEDICATION, CELEBRATION, AND LAUNCH

"Thank you! Thank you! Thank you!" On October 4, 2024, these words of gratitude echoed across Colorado Christian University's (CCU) Lakewood campus throughout the dedication of The Armstrong Center, reflecting the trademark enthusiasm and spirit of the building's namesake. The new 60,000-square-foot facility, named in honor of the late William "Bill" L. Armstrong, former CCU president and distinguished U.S. senator, marks a transformative moment for the University — a celebration of legacy, growth, and forward momentum.

As the fifth building completed under CCU's campus redevelopment plan since 2015, The Armstrong Center houses the School of Music, the University's first dedicated chapel, a state-of-the-art library, performance hall, and essential classroom space. It honors Bill Armstrong's vision and CCU's commitment to cultivating leaders who impact their fields with grace and truth.

The dedication drew over 700 guests from across the country for two days of celebration, starting with a prayer breakfast on October 3, uniting pastors and community leaders in prayer over the new center. The evening featured the William L. Armstrong Award Dinner, honoring Armstrong's significant contributions to CCU with distinguished guests, coordinated by the Centennial Institute and the Armstrong Family Foundation.

The official dedication began Friday, October 4, with gratitude for God's provision and the generous support of

over \$47 million. Speakers included past and present CCU leaders and Armstrong's son, Chairman of the Board of Trustees, Wil Armstrong, who noted, "The dedication of the Armstrong Center is about the future for God's glory and praise."

Reflecting on Bill Armstrong's life and leadership, CCU President Eric Hogue highlighted Armstrong's journey, from the Colorado State House of Representatives at age 25 to becoming the youngest state senate majority leader at 27 to CCU president.

"He was a CCU president who, after a legendary political career, returned to emphasize the importance of leadership coming forth from this University for 20-somethings. That wasn't just an idea for him; he resembled those remarks," said Hogue. "He understood exactly how that could happen in our graduates at age 24 or 25...he had lived it himself."

In his dedication speech, Hogue also acknowledged Ellen Armstrong, Bill's wife and former Board member, stating, "As much as we are honoring this building for Bill Armstrong, we are also honoring Ellen Armstrong." Together, they established a legacy of servant leadership that endures at CCU.

Reflecting the heart of both of his parents, Wil Armstrong emphasized in his dedication speech, "Today is one of the most important days in the history of Colorado Christian

University, but it's not about the new building. It's what happens within these walls, the rising up of the next generation. That's what matters most."

An open house followed the dedication, with Armstrong's favorite treats — pizza and ice cream — served campus-wide and tee-shirts everywhere proclaiming his heartfelt focus of "Jesus! Jesus! Guests eagerly explored the new center, enjoying a preview of the talent and spirit of worship within its walls as School of Music students and faculty provided live performances.

Armstrong affectionately called the School of Music "the front porch" of the University — a welcoming space where initial encounters with CCU could often lead to meaningful conversations about Jesus.

"Through concerts, theater productions, songs, or various events, the performing arts serve as that *front porch* to the University. And on that front porch a conversation about Jesus and who Jesus is for all of us," Hogue explained. "That was a passion for Bill Armstrong and a reason for dedicating this building in his honor."

This multi-faceted facility is a testament to CCU's commitment to providing students with comprehensive resources that enhance their educational experience, especially with CCU's School of Music poised for significant growth.

Over the next decade, President Hogue envisions taking the foundation Bill Armstrong established and developing even more opportunities for students. CCU's School of Music is now positioned to grow into a School of Performing Arts, aligning with Armstrong's vision to use the arts as a tool for outreach and engagement.

The center's McDonald Performance Hall also opens doors to a vibrant future where concerts, orchestras, choirs, contemporary worship arts, theater, and dance can flourish in high production value. It enhances the University's capacity to host special events, nationally recognized speakers, and a broad range of academic presentations and artistic endeavors.

"I would hope that what Bill considered to be 'the front porch' of the University would now become the major magnet for all students thinking about engaging the culture through the performing arts at CCU.

The Armstrong Center dedication is not just a moment of celebration; it's a milestone that ignites momentum for the next chapter in CCU's journey.

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In Due Time

LET US NOT LOSE HEART IN DOING GOOD. FOR IN DUE TIME WE WILL REAP IF WE DO NOT GROW WEARY. ~GALATIANS 6:9

Businesses were closing. Prices were rising. A supply chain shortage fueled anxiety and growing mistrust amongst communities amid the global COVID-19 pandemic. In the summer of 2020, it seemed like much of the world was shutting down.

To Gabrielle Kaufman, it seemed like her world was collapsing.

Residing in Wakefield, Nebraska, a small town of less than 1,500 in the Northeast corner of the state, Kaufman — a married mother of three — had long contemplated returning to school as an adult. Naturally drawn toward helping others, Kaufman searched for a calling and felt increasingly compelled toward a career in counseling.

As her 7-year-old and 5-year-old daughters went off to school, Kaufman seized the opportunity to pursue her dreams. In January 2020, she enrolled at Colorado Christian University (CCU) to earn a bachelor's degree in Applied Psychology with an emphasis in Clinical Counseling. Just two months later, the pandemic forced her children's school to close, and Kaufman suddenly found herself juggling online classes at CCU while homeschooling her kids. Shortly thereafter, the house they were renting was sold and they were evicted.

In just a matter of months, the Kaufmans didn't have a school for their children, a home for their family, or even a hope for the future.

"Since we were a single-income household, and my husband was a farmer, we weren't approved for any loans," she said. "We wanted to stay local for my husband's job and to be near family, but we didn't have anywhere to go. A family friend let us stay with them over the summer, but it seemed like everything else was going against us."

Yet, as the Apostle Paul wrote in Romans 8, "If God is for us, who can be against us?"

"It felt like everything was falling apart," Kaufman said.
"But after four or five months, everything ended up falling into place better than we could have ever imagined."

Founded in 1987, the College of Adult and Graduate Studies (CAGS) at Colorado Christian University was created with the intention of providing top-tier educational opportunities — rigorously developed over CCU's more than 100-year history — for adult learners who sought to balance their studies with work and family commitments.

Built with a flexible, faith-based educational platform in mind, CAGS was designed to provide higher learning and career advancement opportunities to non-traditional students with courses and programs taught from a biblical worldview. The development of this program allowed for CCU students to simultaneously grow in their professional acumen and in their faith.

As time and technology advanced, that led to the introduction of CCU Online in 2017 as a vehicle for enhancing the opportunities offered by CAGS, offering the same accessibility and top-tier education to everyone.

"CCU Online has fully embraced technological advancements to provide top-tier education online to students around the world," said Allison Burkhart, vice president of Enrollment, Marketing, and Student Success for CAGS. "Online higher education empowers individuals to transform their lives, breaking down barriers of geography and time, and opening doors to endless opportunities for growth and innovation."

What started with a mixture of online courses and hybrid opportunities exploded into an educational phenomenon, with CCU Online offering more than 100 degree program options, helping students in all 50 states and scores of nations throughout the world to earn their degrees and transform their futures.

Between 2012 and 2022, CCU saw enrollment growth of more than 128%. While enrollment trends nationwide were falling, expedited by the pandemic, Colorado Christian University was seeing the opposite.

The fall 2024 term saw CCU enrollment both in person and



online surpass 10,500 for the first time in school history with students clamoring to pursue an education that was biblically based and didn't force them to set aside their values.

It was designed for people like Gabrielle Kaufman.

"I didn't want to get sucked into a setting where my morals were going to be questioned while I was trying to learn," she said.

FALLING INTO PLACE

A Pennsylvania native, Kaufman moved to Nebraska with her husband, Jeremiah, to be closer to his family as he worked in row crop farming, cultivating corn and soybeans.

"I had been looking into going to school for counseling for five years," she said. "One college I was looking at closed down. I'd look into it, get nervous, and then back out. I was a part of (The MomCo.), and they partnered with CCU. I heard they offered tuition discounts and scholarships."

Two years before enrolling, Kaufman had applied for a \$10,000 scholarship, hoping but not fully believing it would come through.

"Then my enrollment counselor flew out to our small town with a huge check to surprise me," she said. "I opened the front door and thought, 'This is a dream. This can't really be happening.'

"My second thought was that everyone has seen this on Facebook Live. I can't back out now."

She enrolled and started taking classes that January. With two of three children off to school, it seemed like a good time to focus on school herself.

"I was talking to my husband, and it was very daunting thinking about committing to four years," Kaufman said. "But when I talked to my enrollment counselor, she told me how CCU's courses are only five weeks. You're in and out, then you go on to the next one. That was such a huge sanity saver. Getting into a rhythm made it so much easier to organize and adjust around family time, kids' activities, or sports. It was straightforward."

Then COVID-19 threw them a bit of a curve.

With her children's school closing due to the pandemic, Kaufman became both a student and a teacher.

"I ended up homeschooling them, and it was a lot," she said. "It seems silly, but I ended up needing CCU. It made it so much easier having people to talk to when we were all

so isolated (during lockdown).

"My kids were right there learning with me, but I had people to talk to. There was a student lounge where complete strangers all over the country would get together and pray for each other."

After they were evicted, prayers certainly were needed. But as often tends to happen, the Lord met her when and where she needed Him.

"Everything seemed like it was going against us, but then my husband also decided to enroll at CCU. He had an associate degree, but he received a scholarship that gave him the opportunity to finish his bachelor's degree. All of our assignments weren't just focused on what our thoughts were but on what the Bible says about this. It was so impactful because it forced us to dig into Scripture. Yes, it was for classes, but it also became a habit."

What began as a challenging time turned into an opportunity for renewal. They found a home, continued working toward their degrees, and on May 10, 2024, Jeremiah and Gabrielle Kaufman graduated together — he with a bachelor's in Business with a focus in Entrepreneurship, and she with a bachelor's in Applied Psychology with a Clinical Counseling emphasis.

Gabrielle has since been accepted into CCU's Clinical Mental Health Counseling master's degree program and began her coursework in July.

"The house we ended up in, that we still live in today, had been vacant for 10 years," she said. "So, basically, the whole time we were married. It's like it was sitting there waiting for us. ... The icing on top was when my kids came along to residency and got to see where mom and dad were going to school. Then they went to their school and told everyone how proud they were of us."

The U.S. Department of Education and the Census Bureau provide official data for the results, accompanied by the findings from a nationwide survey of undergraduate students and recent alumni who graduated within the past five years.

In one of the most extensive independent surveys of verified U.S. college students, approximately 110,000 undergraduates and recent alumni anonymously shared their insights. Conducted by College Pulse in partnership with *The Wall Street Journal* and Statista, the survey explored students' views on key components, such as career preparation, learning opportunities, and campus life. The rankings combine these firsthand student experiences with a comprehensive analysis of student outcomes to provide a well-rounded evaluation of higher education institutions.

"Coach Poag has a proven track record of success," said Eric Hogue, CCU president. "I am confident that he will


continue to build on Brian Wall's outstanding leadership and elevate Cougar Athletics into the future."

"While many leaders usually wrap up their careers being the president of a university, Dr. Wall was just getting started," said Daniel LaBry, vice president of University Advancement at CCU. "Joe shined for Jesus in everything he did and with everyone he met."



benediction

Every Sunday morning, at the conclusion of our worship service, our pastor blesses us with a benediction. Quite often the words he speaks over us are from the book of Numbers, the end of chapter six. Those words serve as a kind of punctuation for a long passage about Nazirite vows (definitely a conversation for another time) and are known as "Aaron's Blessing." You know them. "The Lord bless you and keep you; the Lord make His face to shine upon you...." (ESV). The words are beautiful, encouraging, edifying, and comforting. They comprise the perfect benediction. Thank you, Pastor Shawn.

Benedictions are more than just nice words to end a worship service. They elevate the power of goodness given to the recipients, as in the example: the Lord *blessing* and *keeping*. They highlight the strength of a relationship. The recipients are connected to a "blesser" powerful enough to fulfill the promises in the words: the *Lord* blessing and keeping.

As individual Christians, we exult in that goodness and relationship from and with God Almighty. But it's not a stretch, nor inappropriate, to exult in God's benedictory goodness and relationship to Colorado Christian University. As an institution, we proclaim that we are "unapologetically Christian." We promote and produce "Christ-centered higher education" and self-identify as a "Christ-centered community."

Here's the question, though: Does CCU's Christian commitment earn us God's blessing, earn us, per our example, the

Lord's face shining on CCU? The answer is, No. CCU cannot earn God's blessing even with all our Christian focus and intentionality; Almighty God does not owe us anything for our good, Christian work. The blessing value of CCU's Christian ethos puts us in a good place to receive God's blessing, but never think that we earned it.

However, the benediction beauty here is that God has blessed us. His grace, love, power, mercy, and goodness have rained down on our University community just because — because He's a loving, gracious God. The Armstrong Center, full-house enrollment online and on campus, an academic year that ended in good financial shape, and the unifying and ongoing pursuit of being a great Christian university are just a few of the blessings God has bestowed on CCU.

So, back to the Numbers 6 benediction, with a CCU focus:

"The Lord bless you and keep you" — He has!
"The Lord make his face to shine upon you and be gracious to you" — He has!

"The Lord lift up his countenance upon you and give you peace" — He has!

Gratitude and praise be unto our great and gracious God!
